### SITUATIONER ON THE AFTERMATH OF BAGYONG BASYANG IN SURIGAO DEL SUR WITHIN LESS THAN 36 HOURS SINCE LANDFALL

#### A. METEOROLOGICAL STATUS OVERVIEW

According to DOST-PAGASA reports, Bagyong Basyang made landfall at exactly 11:50 pm over the coastal municipality of Bayabas on February 5, 2025, maintaining maximum sustained windspeed of 75 kph, gustiness of up to 90 km/h, and central pressure of 998 hPa, accumulating an average of 200 mm rainfall that registered **Red Rainfall Warning** across the whole province of Surigao del Sur. In perspective, this is significantly greater than 100 mm of rain during Typhoon Auring, which inundated particularly commercial and residential areas of the capital city of Tandag from February 19 to 21, 2021,. With this heavy rainfall, the capital and its surrounding municipalities (namely Tago, San Miguel, Bayabas, Cortes, Lanuza, and San Agustin) are the worst hit.

#### B. STATUS OF INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS (IDPs)

##### **Policy Declaration**

In anticipation of heavy rainfall, the LGUs were quick to declare total work and class suspension (**see list below**) prior to landfall, with 16 coastal municipalities declaring no-sail policy instantaneously. Proactively, 18 of 19 LGUs declared forced evacuation at least 24 hours before landfall.

The ensuing heavy floods have engulfed densely populated, low lying residential and commercial centers in **all 19 LGUs**. The most affected of which are remote barangays near overflowing rivers and streams that experienced floods up to 1.6 meters. Consequently, the typhoon has affected **73,682 families** or **292,886 individuals** living in **244 barangays**. This is equivalent to **45.62% (almost half)** of the total population of **642,000** per 2020 Philippine Statistics Authority being adversely affected by Typhoon Basyang (**see below detailed breakdown of affected population per municipality**).

As of latest tallying at **6:00 PM, February 6, 2025, 28,558 (38.76% of affected) families** consisting of **101,324 individuals** have been displaced inside and outside Evacuation Centers (ECs).

### **Geographical Distribution**

Earlier declaration allowed a total **25,136 families** of **77,685 persons** to evacuate into **354** identified ECs, with the municipality of **Cortes** registering the highest number at **5,311 families** of **18,660 persons** at peak evacuation efforts, followed by **Hinatuan** (**3,325 families** of **10,896 persons**) and **Bislig City** (**3,009 families** of **949 persons**), respectively (**see Table B.1. for detailed breakdown per LGU**).

Outside ECs, **6,167** families of **23,396 persons** have opted to temporarily stay with their relatives and/or friends' houses or decided to utilize private motor vehicles as temporary shelter in the duration of the typhoon.

### Demographics

In terms of age, the bulk of IDPs are **adults (66.36%** are aged **18-59 years** old) who comprise almost half of the displaced population inside ECs; followed by **infants and children (19.61%); teenagers (7.95%);** and **senior citizens (6.02%)**. In terms of gender, IDPs demonstrate an equal profile of **males (50.05%)** and **females (49.95%)**. Of this, **1,540** members of vulnerable sectors were given priority treatment or careful handling as of 3:05 PM, February 6, 2025, with **indigenous peoples** registering the most (**602 individuals, 39%**), followed by 472 **pregnant women (31%)**, **270 persons** with disabilities or PWDs (**17.5%**), **162 solo parents (10.5%)**, and **25 unaccompanied minors (close to 2%)** etc.)

## C. DAMAGES TO LIFE AND INFRASTRUCTURE

### Incidents

With fast rising floods coupled with strong currents, the province has recorded an alarming incidence of landslides and soil erosion blocking road sections critical for mobility of private Surigaonon motorists and commercial trucks/vehicles in Cantilan, Madrid, Lanuza, Cortes, Tandag City, Tago, San Miguel, and Bayabas, and Cagwait due to fallen trees and thick deposits of mud and debris. From Cortes to Lanuza alone, 45 landslides have been recorded in the whole stretch from Cortes to Nurcia, Lanuza.

### Casualties

One (1) person sustained injuries while two deaths have been recorded in Cortes and Carmen. 56-year old Roberto Azanyol in Cantilan slipped while crossing the bridge during evacuation. The 10-year old girl Rica Montero in Cortes died due to multiple trauma and asphyxiation after getting buried in a landslide in upland Tigao while the 53-year old woman Nora Dumas perished after a surge of flood water swept her away in Carmen.

### Damages to Infrastructure

**Damaged Houses.** Damages to a total of **434 houses** have been documented in all 19 LGUs. **37 (8.5%)** of which are totally damaged while **398 (92%)** are only partially destroyed. Among the LGUs, Tago has reported the greatest validated damages amounting to **1.3 million pesos (76% of total amount of 1.8 million pesos in validated damages)**(see listing below).

**Status of Roads and Bridges.** This widespread road blockage not only prevent passage, thereby jeopardizing delivery of urgent rescue operations and ambulatory services but also worsens flooding by restricting drainage capacity. Strong floods have also caused considerable damage to bridges that connect inward barangay centers in the same municipalities to national road networks. A well-documented breakage occurred in the **bridge connecting Surigao-Coastal Road to Brgy. Poblacion, Cortes (see Photo/s below)**.

These incidents have incurred a staggering scale of damage to **provincial roads** amounting to **211 million pesos**, according to realistic estimates by the Provincial Engineering Office (**see table below for detailed breakdown**), and **100 million pesos** of damages to **national roads** maintained by the **Department of Public Works and Highways (see enclosed Situation Report under revised OCD format)**.

As of writing, multiple rounds of survey (see below) indicate major thoroughfares connecting municipalites and cities to national road networks are now generally passable, with some sections in some barangays in **Tago (Victoria and Bajao)** and Lanuza (**Mabahin**) allowing only a single-lane route. Yet, a massive landslide over a 500-meter section in Barangay Nurcia remains unpassable, hindering critical interconnection between CARCANMADCARLAN highway to Tandag City and the rest of southern towns. Nevertheless, as of the latest ocular inspection conducted at 4:00 PM on February 7, 2025, clearing operations by the DPWH are ongoing from both sides of Cortes and Lanuza. Still, a substantial number of bridges connecting remote puroks to town centers require total and immediate repairs like Poblacion bridges in Cagwait and most remarkably Cortes, which totally severed, preventing swift delivery of relief operations to affected communities therein.

**Status of Other Lifelines.** Subsequently, this province-wide road blockage due to massive landslides have caused destruction to multiple modes of lifelines:

- (1) toppling down **electrical lines** requiring over **700,000 pesos worth of repairs**, causing power outages in five municipalities of Cagwait, Cantilan, Carrascal, Marihatag, San Miguel, and Tago;
- (2) contaminating and breaking down water facilities in Barobo and Tandag City that require **110,000 pesos** in rehabilitation;
- (3) Compromising the **structural integrity of sea dikes or sea walls** in Bayabas (38 million pesos), Carmen (20 million pesos), and Lingig (25 million pesos) with repairs valued at **83 million pesos**;
- (4) Weakening school buildings that demand **12,639,000 pesos in repairs, rehabilitation, and reconstruction** in the whole of Tandag City (3,200,000 pesos), Barangay Calatgan of San Miguel (3,939,000 pesos), and Salvacion Elementary School in San Agustin (5,500,000); and
- (5) Requiring **1 million peso-repair** of Government facilities in Tandag City.

In summary, over **800 million** pesos worth of critical lifeline infrastructure have obtained moderate to severe damages and will require immediate repairs and rehabilitation.

**Impact on Agriculture and Fisheries.** Inadvertently, the typhoon has submerged and destroyed **575 million pesos** worth of high value crops and some established agricultural infrastructure, with high concentration of damage in Tandag City (over **144 million pesos**). Relatedly, the fisheries sectors along fresh, brackish, and open sea waters are also expected to sustain damages in aquaculture ponds, seaweed farms, and pump boats in the amounts rivalling records during Typhoon Auring (close to **50 million pesos**).

### **Conclusion: Overall Damage Assessment**

Overall, while Basyang's windspeed seemed non-threatening compared to past typhoons, the unprecedented heavy rainfalls it brought within a 24-hour period has caused significant, widespread, and debilitating damage to the whole province. As of this writing, damages across 1.3 billion pesos (**PhP853,149,837.00**). Therefore, the province of Surigao del Sur is in dire need of urgent assistance from the **Office of the President** to quickly repair critical lifelines and regain normalcy among devastated communities in need of immediate relief and compensation to damaged livelihoods.
