



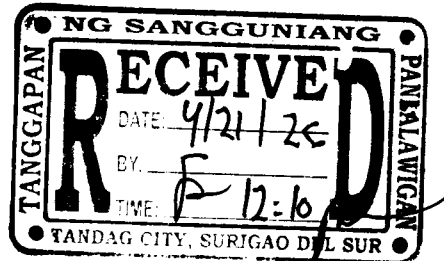

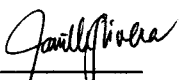

WHEREAS, Section 108 of the Republic Act No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, provides for the participation of accredited civil society organizations and non-government organizations in Local Special Bodies (LSBs) to promote participatory governance;

WHEREAS, on 23 June 2025, the Department of the Interior and Local Government issued a Memorandum Circular No. 2025-060, on the Guidelines on the Accreditation of Civil Society Organizations and Selection of Representatives to the Local Special Bodies;

WHEREAS, Oceanus Conservation, Inc. is a duly registered non-government organization with the Securities and Exchange Commission as #CN202003634, under the formal name of "Oceanus Conservation Inc." engaged in marine and coastal conservation, environmental education, and sustainable livelihood initiatives in Surigao del Sur;

WHEREAS, the organization has been actively working with coastal communities and local government units in the Province of Surigao del Sur in support of environmental protection, and climate resilience;

WHEREAS, representation in a Local Special Body will enable Oceanus Conservation, Inc. to contribute technical expertise, community perspectives, and sectoral representation in local planning, policy formulation, and implementation processes in the Province of Surigao del Sur;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as it is hereby **RESOLVED**, that Oceanus Conservation, Inc. formally expresses its intention to apply for accreditation with the Sangguniang Panlalawigan, pursuant to the procedures and guidelines set forth in Section 108 of the Local Government Code of 1991 and DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2025-060, and apply to membership in a local specialized body in the Province of Surigao del Sur

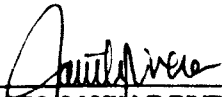

AMENDED BY – LAWS
OF
Oceanus Conservation Inc.

I. THE TIME, PLACE AND MANNER OF CALLING AND CONDUCTING REGULAR OR SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE TRUSTEES.

- a) Regular meetings of the board of trustees of the corporation shall be held monthly.
- b) Special meetings of the board of trustees may be held at any time upon the call of the president.
- c) Meetings of trustees may be held anywhere in or outside of the Philippines, unless the by-laws provide otherwise. Notice of regular or special meetings stating the date, time and place of the meeting must be sent to every trustee at least one (1) day prior to the scheduled meeting, unless otherwise provided by the by-laws. A trustee may waive this requirement, either expressly or impliedly.

II. THE TIME AND MANNER OF CALLING AND CONDUCTING REGULAR OR SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE MEMBERS.

- a) Regular or annual meetings of members shall be held annually on the 1st Monday of January.
- b) Written notice of regular meetings shall be sent to all members of record at least two (2) weeks prior to the meeting, unless a different period is required by the by-laws.
- c) Special meetings of members shall be held at any time deemed necessary or as provided in the by-laws.
- d) Written notice of special meetings shall be sent to all members at least one week prior to the meeting unless a different period is required by the by-laws.
- e) Members' meetings, whether regular or special, shall be held in the city or municipality where the principal office of the corporation is located, and if practicable in the principal office of the corporation. Metro Manila shall, for the purpose of this provision, be considered city or municipality.

III. THE REQUIRED QUORUM IN MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- a) The required quorum in meetings of members shall consist of the member/s representing a majority of the entire membership.

IV. THE FORM FOR PROXIES OF MEMBERS AND THE MANNER OF VOTING THEM

- a) Members may vote in person or by proxy in all meetings of members. Proxies shall be in writing, signed by the member and filed before the scheduled meeting with the corporate secretary. Unless otherwise provided in the proxy, it shall be valid only for the meeting for which it is intended. No proxy shall be valid and effective for a period longer than five (5) years at any one time.

V. THE QUALIFICATIONS, DUTIES, TERM AND COMPENSATION OF TRUSTEES

- a) No person convicted by final judgment of an offense punishable by imprisonment for a period exceeding six (6) years, or a violation of this Code, committed within five (5) years prior to the date of his election shall qualify as a trustee. No person shall be elected as a trustee unless he is a member of the corporation. A majority of the trustees must be residents of the Philippines.
- b) The corporate powers of the corporation be exercised, all business conducted and all property of the corporation be controlled and held by the board of trustees to be elected from among the members, who shall hold office for one (1) year and until their successors are elected and qualified.
- c) The trustees and members of the Board shall not receive any compensation or any remuneration for their services to the organization.
(As amended on April 11, 2023)

VI. THE MANNER OF ELECTION OR APPOINTMENT, QUALIFICATION AND THE TERM OF OFFICE OF ALL OFFICERS OTHER THAN TRUSTEES

- a) Immediately after their election, the trustees of a corporation must formally organize by the election of a PRESIDENT, who shall be a trustee, a TREASURER who may or may not be a trustee, a SECRETARY who shall be a resident and citizen of the Philippines, and such other officers as may be provided in the by-laws. Two (2) or more positions may be held concurrently by the same officer, however no one shall act as PRESIDENT and SECRETARY or as PRESIDENT and TREASURER at the same time. The officers of the corporation shall hold office for one (1) year and until the successors are elected and qualified. The officers of the corporation shall perform functions as required by existing laws, rules and regulations.

VII. FISCAL YEAR

- a) The fiscal year of the corporation shall begin on and shall end of each January 1 December 31 year.

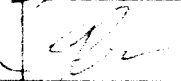
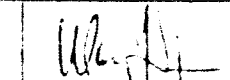
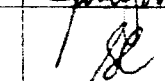

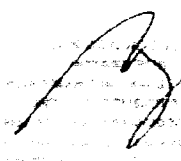
- a) Matters not covered by the provisions of these by-laws shall be governed by the provisions of the Corporation Code of the Philippines.

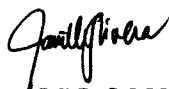

2025 Minutes of Annual Meeting

Activity: Annual General Meeting – 2025

Participants: Camille Rivera, Alfredo Roa, Klas Lundgren

Date and Time: Jan 13 2025, 10:30am

Expectations for the Activity: To reflect on the organization's 2024 accomplishments, assess lessons learned from community engagement and conservation efforts, and align strategic priorities, team direction, and operational plans for 2025.

General Objective:

To evaluate Oceanus Conservation's impact in 2024 and define strategic directions for 2025, ensuring that conservation efforts remain community-driven, science-based, and sustainable.

Specific Objectives:

- To present and reflect on the 2024 financial and programmatic performance
- To assess the impact of conservation initiatives on communities and ecosystems
- To align on key priorities, activities, and organizational direction for 2025

Agenda & Key Discussions

1. 2024 Accomplishments & Financial Report

Oceanus reported a strong impact in 2024, including 16 hectares of mangrove rehabilitation, 41,000+ mangroves planted, and 129 community members trained.

Beyond outputs, the team emphasized the human impact—livelihood support, increased environmental awareness, and stronger local stewardship. Community testimonials highlighted how conservation efforts directly benefited households, especially women involved in restoration.

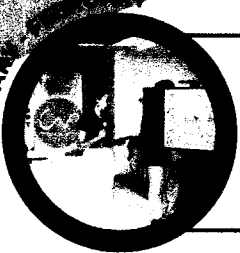

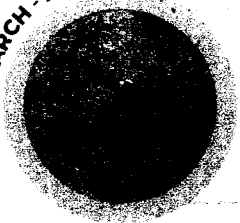

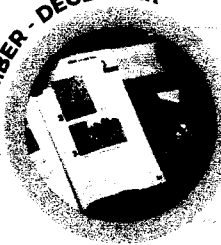

AMPLIFYING UNHEARD VOICES: COMMUNITY STORYTELLING AS A CATALYST FOR CHANGE

At Oceanus, we believe true resilience is narrated by those who live it. Our Community Storytelling Initiative moves beyond traditional reporting to place the lens—and the narrative—directly into the hands of coastal stewards. This project provides a critical platform for communities often excluded from environmental and development dialogues, transforming them from subjects into authors of their own climate story.

Empowerment Through Perspective

In partnership with the Global Environmental Institute, we equipped community members in Cagwait, Surigao del Sur, and Zamboanga Sibugay with basic digital cameras and photography training. This participatory approach enabled them to document their daily realities—the labor of seaweed farming, the hope in planting mangroves, the scars of erosion, and the solidarity in recovery. The resulting photo-essay book, *“Tides of Resilience: Stories from Our Shores”* is a raw and powerful testament crafted entirely through their eyes.

From the Community to the Global Stage

The distributed book has resulted in profound connections, humanizing abstract climate impacts. Its success is measured in two key dimensions, through **Internal Empowerment** and **External Influence**. Participants gained not just technical skills, but a renewed sense of agency and ownership over their narrative. The book has reached influential audiences, sparking dialogue and shifting perspectives. Notably, a copy was presented to and appreciated by Dr. Sylvia Earle, a pinnacle of ocean advocacy—signaling that these grassroots voices are resonating at the highest levels of global conservation.

A Glimpse into the Narrative

The book’s foreword captures its essence: “These are not just photographs—they are testaments of adaptation, resistance, and care... we are invited not only to see—but to act.” The introduction clarifies our mission: to ensure that those on the frontlines of climate change are the ones telling their story, highlighting how mangroves and blue carbon ecosystems are interwoven with livelihood, identity, and survival.

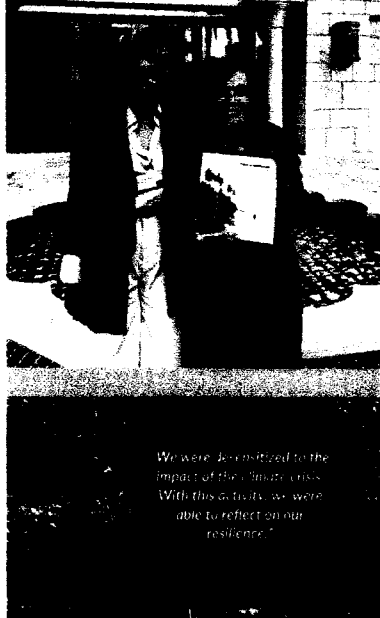
Looking Forward: Scaling the Narrative

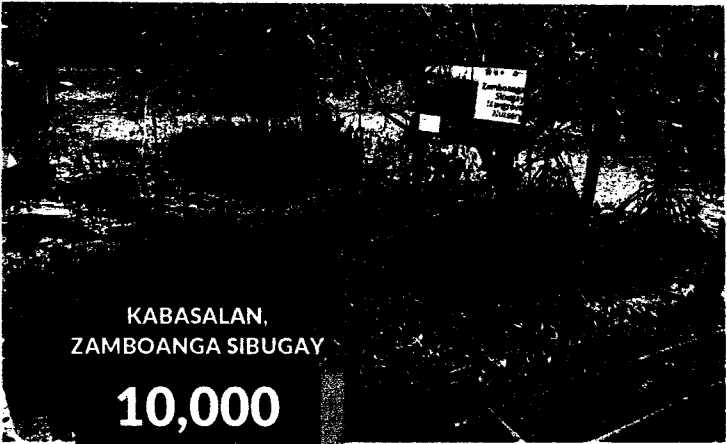

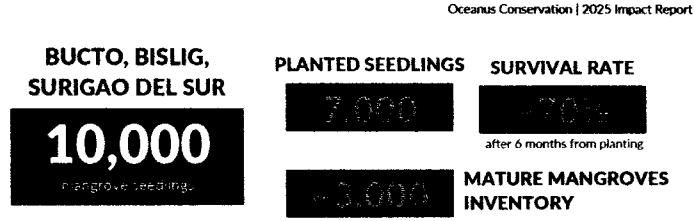

TECH-BASED MANGROVE MONITORING: PILOT IN SURIGAO DEL SUR

How can up-and-coming technological innovations work hand in hand with conservation efforts? The “AI/Machine Learning-Powered Digital Monitoring of Mangrove Ecosystems in Surigao del Sur” aims to improve mangrove monitoring through mobile data collection and drone imagery, in collaboration with Thinking Machines Data Science, Gainforest, and Global Green Growth Institute with support from BIMP-EAGA-ROK Cooperation Fund.

From its conception in May 2024, until its closing last December 2025, the project has conducted training and stakeholder events in Bislig City in its efforts to (1) Improve implementation and planning of nature-based solutions and through digitalization of mangrove monitoring and (2) scaling and replication of digital monitoring methods to other nature-based solution projects and organizations. With the City of Bislig being one of the most populous coastal areas in Surigao del Sur susceptible to tsunamis, flood, and storm surges, the project aims to highlight the importance of their existing mangrove ecosystems.



Data collection was done through the use of mobile phones, drone imagery, and AI/ML analysis. In efforts of mangrove restoration, the project has successfully established a mangrove nursery located in Barangay Bucto, from which seedlings were planted and monitored by the team and the local community. A database for mature trees and 120-m drone imagery were produced in efforts to conserve existing mature mangrove forests as well, with a focus on Barangay Caguyao and Tumanan.



These training and knowledge sharing activities with coastal barangays and local government agencies highlights the potential impact of improved monitoring in protecting mangrove ecosystems. Data collected throughout the project can be utilized for city zoning, guiding plans, and implementing existing policies such as the Local Coastal Greenbelt Ordinance. As the project comes to a close, a policy advisory for the methodologies tested and developed for digital mangrove restoration and conservation is currently being crafted for its use and integration for relevant government agencies.

Digital tools make mangrove monitoring faster, precise, and scalable—but they are only as powerful as the people on the ground. Local communities remain the heart of it all: the hands that plant, the eyes that watch, and the generations that care. People remain at the center of every effort to conserve and restore our mangrove forests. This project successfully proves that when technology, community, and policy work together, mangrove restoration and conservation becomes possible, measurable, scalable, and worth defending for generations to come.



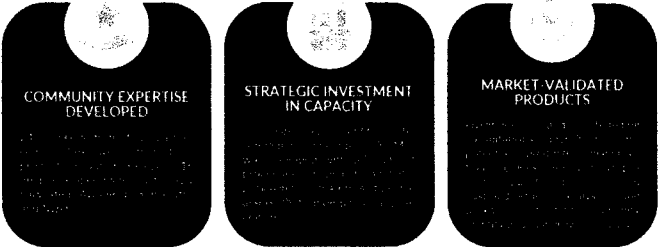
PIONEERING SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD: A FIRST-IN-THE-PHILIPPINES INITIATIVE

In 2025, we successfully advanced from capacity-building to the pre-pilot phase, constructing a full pathway to economic and ecological resilience:

By creating market demand for non-timber resources, we directly increase the economic value of a preserved mangrove forest. Early, strong interest from Local Government Units signals recognition of this model's potential for replication and policy support.

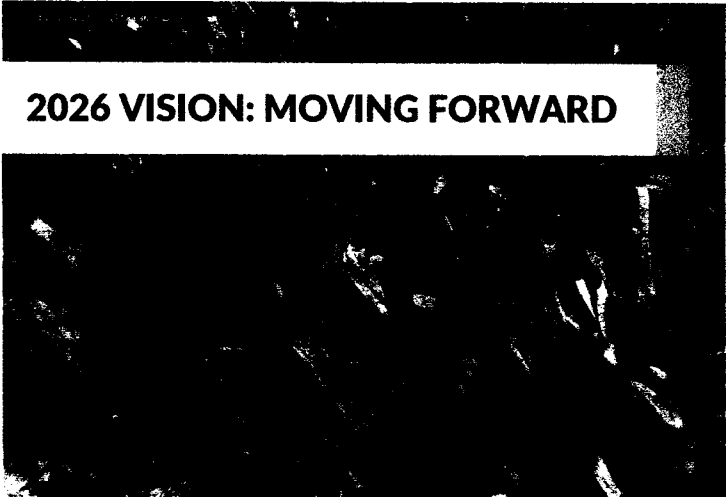

This project directly addresses the current gap in localized expertise, documentation, and conservation protocols, ensuring dugong strandings and habitat threats are met with an effective, informed response.

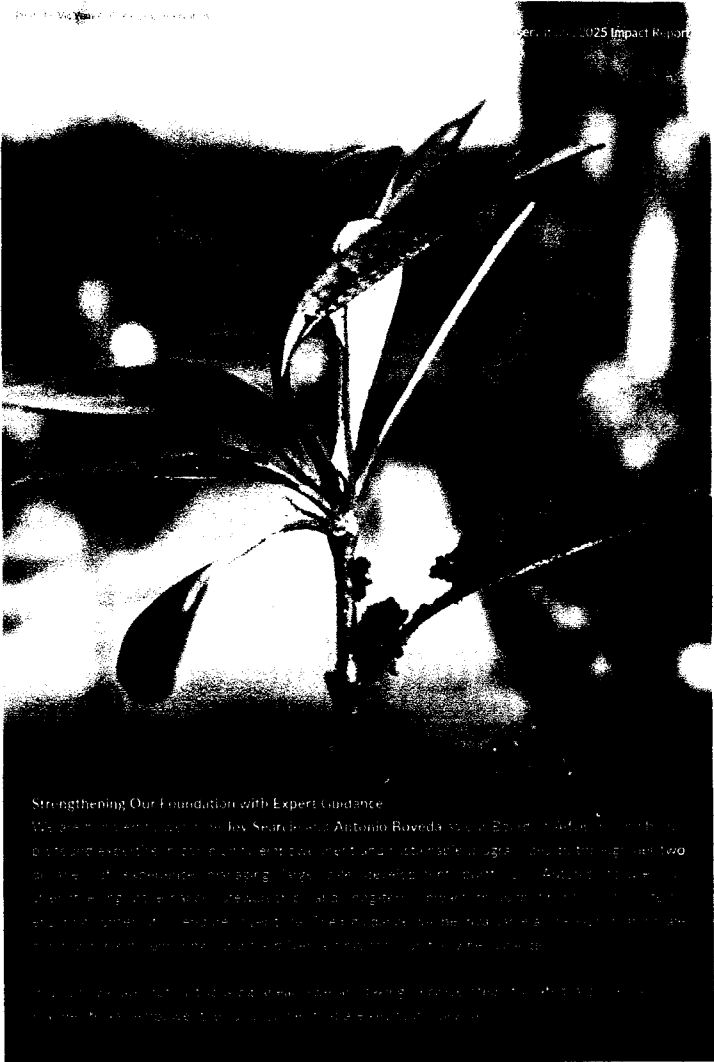

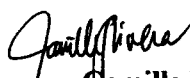

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinion

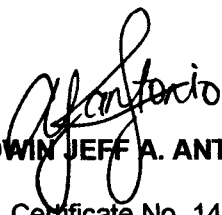

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Oceanus Conservation Inc. (the Corporation) was incorporated in the Philippines on March 20, 2020. It is a non-stock, not-for-profit organization formed and operated generally to conduct scientific research and engage with local and national stakeholders in providing, but not limited to, technical services, technical support, data services and environmental consultancy to pressing issues that is connected with or to any bodies of water i.e. from lakes, rivers, coasts to oceans.

The Corporation's principal place of business is at Unit 404, La Fuerza Plaza Building 2, 2241 Chino Roces Avenue, Bangkal, Makati City.

The accompanying financial statements of the Corporation were approved and authorized for issue by the Board of Trustees on April 10, 2025.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This is the set of financial statements prepared by the Corporation in accordance with the Philippine Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (the "Framework") issued by the Philippine Accounting Standards Board. The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

2.1. Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Framework and are presented in Philippine Peso (₱) and the figures are rounded to the nearest peso.

2.2. Accounting Standards and Policies Adopted

The Corporation adopted the following accounting standards:

PFRS 7 "Financial Instruments: Disclosure "(Revised), Improving Disclosures about Financial Instruments become effective January 1, 2009. This amendment improves the disclosure requirements about the fair value measurements and reinforces existing principles for disclosures about the liquidity risk associated with financial instruments. The Corporation shall classify fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. In addition, this amendment clarifies and enhances the existing requirements for the disclosure of liquidity risk. The Corporation is required to disclose the maturity analysis for non-derivative financial liabilities (including issued financial guarantee contracts) that shows the remaining contractual maturities.

PAS 1 "Presentation of Financial Statements (Revised)", become effective for financial years beginning on or after January 1, 2009. It establishes the amendments to the presentation of information in the financial statements. PAS 1 (Revised) describes the "balance sheet" and the "cash flow statement" as the "statements of financial position" and "statements of cash flows", respectively. However, the use of the other terms with clear meaning is allowed. It also requires the presentation of all non-owners' changes in equity (i.e., comprehensive income) in a statement of comprehensive income or in a statement of profit or loss together with a statement of comprehensive income, separately from changes in equity. PAS 1 (Revised) also requires, as a minimum, the presentation of three statements of financial position

(balance sheet) in a complete set of financial statements whenever there is a prior period adjustment or a reclassification of items in the financial statements as at the end of the current period, the end of the comparative period and the beginning of the comparative period. In other cases, only two statements of financial position are required. Dividends recognized as distributions to shareholders and related per-share amounts should be presented on the face of the statements of changes in equity or in the notes and not on the face of the statement of comprehensive income or the face of the income statement.

PAS 7, "Cash Flow Statements", requires the provision of information about the historical changes in cash and cash equivalents of an entity by means of a cash flow statement which classifies cash flows during the period from operating, investing and financing activities.

PAS 8 "Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors", removes the concept of fundamental error and the allowed alternative to retrospective restatement to correct prior period errors. It defines material omission or misstatements and describes how to apply the concept of materiality when applying accounting policies and correcting errors.

PFRS 15, "Revenue", provides additional guidelines as to the timely recognition of revenue, which is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

PAS 32 "Financial Instruments: Disclosure and Presentation", which prescribes the requirements for the presentation of financial instruments and identifies the information that should be disclosed about them. The presentation requirements apply to the classification of financial instruments, from the perspective of the issuer, into financial assets, financial liabilities, and equity instruments; the classification of related interest, dividends, losses, and gains; and the circumstances in which financial assets and financial liabilities should be offset. The standard requires disclosure of information about factors that affect the amount, timing and certainty of an entity's future cash flows relating to financial instruments and the accounting policies applied to those instruments.

PAS 36 "Impairment of Assets": prescribes the procedures that an entity applies to ensure that its assets are carried at no more than their recoverable amount if its carrying amount exceeds the amount to be recovered through use or sale of the asset. If this is the case, the asset is described to be impaired, and the standard requires the entity to recognize an impairment loss. The standard also specifies when an entity should reverse an impairment loss previously recognized. The revised standard clarifies the elements that should be reflected in the calculation of an asset's value in use. PAS 36 prescribes the frequency of impairment testing for intangible assets.

PFRS 9, "Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement", which prescribes the principles for recognizing, measuring, and disclosing information about financial assets and financial liabilities.

The significant accounting policies and practices of the Corporation are set forth to facilitate the understanding of the financial statements.

FINANCIAL ASSETS

Financial assets include cash on hand and in banks and other financial instruments. Financial assets, other than hedging instruments, are classified into the following categories: financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments, and available-for-sale financial assets. Financial assets are assigned to the different categories by management on initial recognition, depending on the purpose for which the investments were acquired.

As of December 31, 2023, the Corporation has no financial asset at fair value through profit or loss. The Corporation also has no held-to-maturity investments and available for sale investments.

Cash in Bank

Cash includes cash on hand and cash in local banks. This includes bank interest income earned, net of final withholding tax, from cash in bank.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any allowance for impairment losses. The initial cost of property and equipment consists of its purchase price, any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use. Major repairs are capitalized as part of property and equipment only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged against current operations as incurred.

Depreciation commences once the property and equipment are available for use and is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the property and equipment as follows:

The assets' useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed periodically to ensure that the amounts, period, and methods of depreciation are consistent with the expected pattern of economic benefits from items of property and equipment.

When property and equipment are retired or otherwise disposed of, the cost and the related accumulated depreciation and accumulated provision for impairment losses, if any, are removed from the accounts and any resulting gain or loss is credited or charged against current activities.

Fully depreciated assets are retained as property and equipment until these are no longer in use.

Property and equipment are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. If any such indication exists and where the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its estimated recoverable amount, the asset or cash-generating unit is, written down to its recoverable amount. The estimated recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less cost to sell and value-in use. The fair value less cost to sell is the amount obtainable from the sale of an asset in an arm's length transaction less the costs of disposal while value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset. For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, the estimated recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of income.

FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

Financial liabilities include trade and other payables, non-interest-bearing borrowing, and advances from shareholders. These are recognized when the Corporation becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Accounts Payable

Trade and other payables are recognized initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

FUND BALANCE

The Corporation considers its fund balance as capital. It consists of contributions, donations, and accumulated excess of revenue over expenses.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES RECOGNITION

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Corporation and the revenue can be measured reliably. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received, excluding discounts and rebates. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognized:

Donations

Income is recognized at fair market value at the time these are received and becomes receivable from donors.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognized as the interest accrues taking into account the effective yield on the asset. This is presented net of final withholding taxes paid.

Expenses Recognition

Expenses are decreases in economic benefits during the accounting period in the form of outflows or decrease in assets or incurrence of liabilities that result in decreases of fund balance, other than those relating to distributions to equity participants. Expenses are generally recognized when incurred.

Program Expenses

Program expenses pertain to the costs associated with the release of funds to operate the projects implemented by the Corporation such as sponsorship program, etc. Program expenses are generally recognized when the expenses are incurred.

Administrative Expenses

Expenses related to the general corporate overhead and in the administration of day-to-day operations of the Corporation are generally recognized when the expenses are incurred.

INCOME TAXES

The Corporation uses the taxes payable method to account for income taxes. Under this method, the Corporation recognizes income tax expense and liability based on the taxable income for the year using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events that provide additional information about the Corporation's financial position at the balance sheet date (adjusting events) are reflected in the financial statements. Subsequent events that are indicative of conditions that arose after balance sheet date are disclosed in the Corporation's financial statements when material.

3. CASH IN BANK

The Corporation's cash in bank amounted to ₱3,549,459 and ₱2,950,965 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. There is no cash restriction on the Corporation's cash balances.

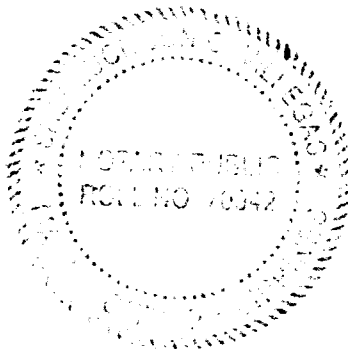
